#### **NURSE A SCHOOL ACTIVITY**

St. Monica Secondary School, Ondo

This month, we're spotlighting the impactful work of Health for Nigeria (HFN) through our Nurse A School (NAS) program, reinforcing our commitment to community well-being across our partner states. Our dedicated nurses continue to lead health inspections, engage in knowledge-sharing sessions, and promote healthier, more supportive school environments.

During the school assembly at St. Monica Secondary School, Ondo, members of the Health Club led an enlightening session on the topic of drug abuse, delivered confidently by student presenters.

The session focused on raising awareness about the harmful effects of drug misuse and its impact on physical, mental, and social well-being. Students discussed common causes of drug abuse among young people, including peer pressure, curiosity, and emotional stress, while emphasizing the importance of making informed, healthy choices. They also educated their peers on recognizing warning signs of drug abuse and encouraged anyone struggling—or aware of someone at risk—to seek help from trusted adults or professionals.

#### **NURSE A SCHOOL ACTIVITY**

At Oreki Secondary School in Oghareki, Delta State

At Oreki Secondary School in Oghareki, Delta State, Nurse Amadin facilitated an engaging and practical session on Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) during the school's health club meeting. The session was designed to equip students with essential life-saving knowledge and emergency response skills that could make a critical difference in real-life situations.

Nurse Amadin began by explaining the importance of CPR, highlighting how prompt intervention can save lives during cardiac or respiratory emergencies. She carefully outlined each step of the CPR process, ensuring students understood the sequence of actions required to perform effective chest compressions and rescue breaths.

To reinforce this knowledge, students were given the opportunity to practice CPR techniques under Nurse Amadin's guidance. This hands-on component allowed them to demonstrate what they had learned, build confidence in their abilities, and correct any mistakes in real-time.

At Comprehensive High School, Ode-Irele

During the recent Health Club meeting at Comprehensive High School, Ode-Irele, students participated in an informative session focused on understanding Malaria—one of the most prevalent health challenges in their communities. The discussion aimed to equip students with the knowledge to recognize the disease, understand its causes, and take preventive measures to protect themselves and their families.

The session began with an explanation of how malaria is caused by parasites transmitted through the bites of infected mosquitoes. Students learned about the malaria transmission cycle and how it thrives in environments with stagnant water. The facilitator emphasized the importance of early detection, explaining how timely treatment can significantly reduce complications and save lives.

Students were taught to identify key signs and symptoms of malaria, including fever, chills, headaches, vomiting, and general body weakness, empowering them to seek medical attention promptly if they or someone around them shows these signs.

In addition, the session highlighted practical preventive strategies such as sleeping under insecticide-treated nets, clearing stagnant water sources around homes, and maintaining clean surroundings to disrupt mosquito breeding. By the end of the meeting, students left with a stronger understanding of malaria prevention and a commitment to share this knowledge with their peers and families, contributing to healthier communities.

#### **NURSE A SCHOOL ACTIVITY**

At Bashorun Ojoo High School, Ibadan

During the Health Club meeting at Bashorun Ojoo High School, Ibadan, students participated in an enlightening and interactive session on constipation, a common digestive issue that can affect people of all ages. Led by Nurse Ige, the session aimed to raise awareness about the importance of digestive health and empower students with practical knowledge they could apply in their daily lives.

Nurse Ige explained the causes of constipation, such as low fiber intake, inadequate hydration, lack of physical activity, and ignoring the urge to use the restroom. She described common symptoms, including infrequent or difficult bowel movements, abdominal discomfort, and bloating, using simple language and relatable examples to ensure everyone understood.

The session emphasized the importance of maintaining a balanced diet rich in fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, drinking enough water, and engaging in regular physical activity as key steps to prevent constipation. Nurse Ige also stressed the need to listen to their bodies and avoid delaying trips to the restroom, as this can worsen digestive issues.

Students actively engaged in the discussion, asking insightful questions and sharing personal experiences. Their enthusiasm and willingness to learn created an open and supportive environment, helping to reinforce the importance of good digestive habits and overall well-being among their peers.
